





## **MAP OF NIGERIA**

Nigeria, with an estimated population of 186,000,000 is the largest black nation in the world.

The Federal Republic of Nigeria, as it is officially known, covers an area of 356,669 square miles on the coast of West Africa.

Its borders are contiguous with the Federal Republic of Cameroon to the east, Niger Republic to the north and Benin Republic to the west. In the northeast. Nigeria a Capitalist Democracy and is divided administratively into thirty-six states and the Federal Capital Territory of Abuja.

Nigeria's diversity is seeing in the presence of an estimated 250 Ethnic Group speaking over four hundred languages and dialects (Encyclopedia Britannica).

Christians and Muslims comprise more than 80 percent of the population while the rest are identified with indigenous religions. However, Nigeria's greatest diversity is in its people.



**Note:** Nigeria's greatest diversification is not in its rich agricultural produce but its people, who are of diverse ethnicity and cultural background.


